Drama in the Cathedral Kenneth Pickering

This revised edition of Kenneth Pickering's study of the development of the Canterbury Festival and the resurgence of religious drama, is published to coincide with the author's appearance as Becket in a major new production of T. S. Eliot's *Murder in the Cathedral*.

At the start of the twentieth century there was a great deal of hostility from the Church towards drama. Dr Pickering explores the changing attitudes which enabled the Dean of Canterbury to establish the Festival and lay the foundations for religious drama to play the important role in the spreading of the Christian message which it does today. A must for all those with an interest, either general or academic, in religious drama and the modern development of the stage.

Further Steps in Stagecraft Susan Richmond

The sequel to *Textbook of Stagecraft* and, although they are of value on their own, together they provide a complete study course. The exercises given, such as inflection and characterisation, are designed to stretch the student's abilities even further.

An Illustrated Guide to Staging History

Book One: Egyptian, Greek, Roman and Medieval Theatre

Getting the staging right for period plays is difficult, but it is essential for proper realisation. Mary has drawn on her many years of experience as a drama teacher to provide invaluable help on getting the period detail right. The first section details the common principles, such as types of stage, columns, scenic decoration and the making of props. The second section takes each period in turn and analyses the development of theatre, architecture and stage sets. Following chapters give detailed drawings of the dress, armour, furniture, pottery and decoration. With this book you will always be able to find the answer to questions like: "What did Egyptian chairs look like", "What style crozier did a medieval bishop carry?"

Improvisation: Project and Practice Robert Newton

The producer or actor who has yet to find a sound method of work will find this book invaluable. However, the more experienced will be glad to have the basic principles restated.

The Single Source of all Filth: The Jeremy Collier Controversy David Self

192 pages £9.95 978-0-85343-626-3

In the 1680s, a non-juring priest, Jeremy Collier, launched a vitriolic attack on the excesses of Restoration Theatre. In doing so, he started a vicious pamphlet war which was to change the history of drama. Puritanical in his views, Collier attacked the profanity and debauchery of the stage and demanded its abolition. In response, several playwrights, including Vanbrugh and Congreve, wrote in defence of drama whilst conceding that its excesses needed taming.

A huge number of pamphlets were written and, although Collier's arguments were often flawed and over-zealous, he caught the mood of the times and as a direct result Vanbrugh and Congreve's careers were cut short. His final victory came with the establishment of the Office of Lord Chamberlain to censor plays - which lasted until the 1960s. This important chapter in the development of the modern theatre has escaped close academic scrutiny and for the first time all the major pamphlets and plays written during this war are reproduced here for students, both serious and amateur, of theatre history.

Stage Management and Theatrecraft Hendrik Baker

The author discusses the development of a stage production; marking scripts; rehearsals; the stage crew; the stage; first nights and running the play. This edition discusses the *National Theatre*, the restoration of Victorian theatres, the design of new acting areas for the open stage and the application of rnicroprocessing to lighting control. Hendrik Baker used his own work as designer, stage manager and director to illustrate this excellent guide to stage management. Useful for students and amateurs.

Doris Day explains how adjudicators arrive at their hundreds of annual adjudications. Who selects them? Do they get training? How do they judge a performance? Illustrated by personal anecdotes, the author sets out the things which have influenced her judgement. She recalls good and bad treatment by officials and actors which will prompt everyone involved with Festivals to ask themselves how often they have been guilty of thoughtlessness. Doris Day is a successful actress, drama director and author of many festival-winning plays. She served as Chairman of the *Guild of Drama Adjudicators*, of which she is now an Honorary Member.
